Here's why: sperm can live inside your body for up to five days, waiting for the egg to be released for fertilization.

So, when your doctor confirms your pregnancy, you'll likely already be around 4 or 5 weeks along. This happens because the first two weeks of pregnancy are

counted from your last period, even though conception hasn't occurred yet. This calculation method makes tracking and planning easier.

## **Pregnancy in Weeks, Months, and Trimesters**

### *How Long Does Pregnancy Last?*

The short answer: 280 days, 40 weeks, or just over 9 months. While this is the standard term, keep in mind that babies can be born a few weeks earlier or later than this expected date.

### *How Many Trimesters Are There?*

Pregnancy is divided into three trimesters:

- First trimester (early pregnancy)
- Second trimester (middle pregnancy)
- Third trimester (late pregnancy)

Each trimester lasts approximately 13–14 weeks:

- The first trimester ends at week 13.
